On Saturday, May 3, the third annual Jane Jacob's was held in Carthage. The crowd gathered at the Breezeway at the south end of Courthouse Square to begin the walk. The weather was beautiful and the temperature was perfect for a stroll around town. New "old" photos were displayed beginning with a photo of the south side of the square that included the Walker building which formerly occupied the space from which the Breezeway was created. Stops included places on North Van Buren that were added to the Jane's Walk for the first time. The crowd was treated to memories from various members of the group about businesses that used to occupy many of the storefronts on Van Buren and on Court Street. A film of Carthage that was made during the 1940s was played showing the Square and Carthage Elementary. March 22, 1889

The Baptist church selected a site for the new church on Van Buren at halfway between the Cadenhead and Davis residences.
