April in Mississippi History

April 7, 1798

Congress establishes Mississippi Territory, including portions of present-day Alabama and Mississippi. The territory was governed by a ruling council comprised of a governor, a secretary and 3 judges. Natchez was selected as territorial capital. President John Adams appointed Winthrop Sargent as first territorial governor.

April 1813

U. S. forces capture Mobile from the Spanish. Spain no longer controlled any part of Mississippi Territory.

History (cont.)

April 1825

Marquis de Lafayette visits Natchez. The visit of the Revolutionary War ally was considered one of the social events of the decade.

April 12, 1861

The Civil War begins when Confederate forces opened fire on Fort Sumter in Charleston, S.C.

April 1862

The Union Army, with 100,000 troops, began the siege of Corinth, MS, an important railroad crossroad.

April 1865

After Robert E. Lee's surrender at Appomattox Courthouse, VA, Confederate forces began surrendering. General Joseph E. Johnston surrendered the Army of Tennessee to General Sherman at Durham, N.C. Lieutenant General Richard Taylor surrendered all forces in the Confederate Department of Alabama, Mississippi and East Louisiana.
